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## School Profile

### Community

Stockton Early College Academy (SECA) is in the heart of urban Stockton, CA. It is a dependent charter school in the Stockton Unified School District, which serves approximately 38,000 students. SECA's student body is approximately 60% free or reduced lunch. The school is culturally diverse, with a population that is <1% American Indian or Alaskan Native, 44% Asian, 2.5% African American, 47% Hispanic, <1% Pacific Islander, and 4.4% White (not Hispanic).

### School Accreditation/Awards/Recognitions

SECA is an early college high school enrolling approximately 430 students in grades 9-12. SECA is accredited by the **Western Association of Schools & Colleges (WASC)**. During the 2012-2013 school year, SECA ranked as the highest-performing academic high school in San Joaquin County with a **923 Academic Performance Index (API)**. Currently, 72% of our Senior class holds a weighted GPA of 4.0 or above. SECA has been recognized as an Honor Roll School by the **Campaign for Business & Educational Excellence** (in 2012, 2013, and 2014) for closing the achievement gap for high-poverty students. In 2017, Jay Mathews of the **Washington Post** recognized SECA as one of the **Most Challenging High Schools** in the country; we have been honored several times since, including in 2022. SECA is also recognized among the country's top high schools by **US News & World Report** (from 2015-2023); SECA is currently ranked #18 in California and #131 in the Nation. SECA is also a three-time **CA Distinguished School** (2019, 2021, 2023).

### Curriculum

Students take a highly accelerated and enriched high school core curriculum consisting of Honors, Advanced Placement classes, and a combination of college courses through San Joaquin Delta College (SJDC). These college courses are transferable to four-year California public universities under the Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum. Students who complete our program earn all or part of an Associate in Arts degree from SJDC while earning their high school diploma. We operate on a 90-minute A/B block schedule. Students take a set of four classes on "A" days and four different classes on "B" days (eight courses). Stockton Unified School District requires 210 credits for graduation. SECA students exceed those requirements and average over 300 credits.

SECA offers the following AP courses: European History, Biology, Physics 1, English Language and Composition, US History, US Government & Politics, Micro-Economics, and Precalculus. All students must take their grade level AP course(s) and exam. AP Calculus AB/BC has been replaced with SJDC's Math 1 and Math 2. Students who pass both will be prepared to enroll in **college-level:** Multivariable Calculus, Differential Equations, Linear Algebra, and Mechanics Physics.

We offer the following Pre-AP Courses: Freshman English 1, Sophomore English 2, Biology, Chemistry, World History & Geography, Algebra I, and Geometry. We offer Honors courses in Algebra II and Precalculus (Sp 2024).

## Grade Point Average (GPA) Calculation/College Credits

GPA is computed using the above quality points. Honors, AP, and College courses are weighted by one point. College courses are given high school credit at the rate of 3.33 credits per 1 college unit, with a cap of ten high school credits per course. Students are allowed to repeat courses per Stockton Unified School District's School Board policy and SJDC policy.

## Class Rank

Students are ranked beginning in grade nine, and all grades are included in the total grade point average.

## Student Achievement Data

The **California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP)** assesses standards for English Language Arts/Literacy (ELA) and Mathematics.

### ELA:

- 91% Met or Exceeded the CCS standard and are currently ready for college-level English or will be ready upon completion of a Senior English course.

*Note: 44% of this class passed the AP English Language & Composition exam and will take a 2<sup>nd</sup>-year college-level English composition course. 56% of this class will enroll in a 1<sup>st</sup>-year college-level English composition course.*

### Math:

- 60% Met or Exceeded the CCS standard and are currently ready for college-level Math or will be prepared upon completing a Senior Mathematics course.

*Note: All Seniors are enrolled in either a fourth-year high school Math course or a college-level Math course (unless completed during the Summer of 2024).*

**Class of 2024 college acceptance rate:** 96% of Seniors were accepted to four-year Colleges/Universities; 7% of graduates planned to attend two-year Colleges. Ninety-three percent of the graduated class completed 31-65 college units at San Joaquin Delta College.
